

Jim Jones and Bob Pratt – Healing Hands at the End of a Lifecycle

When a member of the Beth Shalom community passes away, an overflowing of support and love comes to the bereaved. It is not unusual for meals to be catered, children to be cared for, and each house sitting Shiva full of family and friends. This community is blessed to have so many caring individuals who would stop at nothing to ensure those in mourning are fully cared for. Sometimes, however, two exceptional people, who have made it their life's work to comfort and care for the grief-stricken, can be forgotten. We want to say a long overdue thank you to Jim Jones and Bob Pratt, the caretakers of Mt. Carmel Cemetery.



Jim and Bob have

worked at Mt. Carmel for twenty-four and twenty-three years, respectively. Jim recalls fondly August 2, 1995 as "A great day." For this was the day Bob Pratt started, and the two men have been working side-by-side ever since. In speaking of their time together, they both laugh and say, "We have to lie to each other to say anything new!" They are quite the pair.

Mt. Carmel Cemetery is 27 acres and is fully maintained by Jim and Bob. When asked what made you stay here for so long, Jim responds, "The People. I love helping people. But also, it's this place [Mt. Carmel]. I just love this place." His and Bob's love of Mt. Carmel is confirmed by the impeccable grounds and the stunning recently renovated Yukon Chapel.

As Bob says, "The Cemetery has a life of its own." There is so much that goes into keeping Mt. Carmel pristine, from stopping vandals from disrespecting the facility to cleaning up after large storms. But you couldn't see any of this stress on either of their faces.

In his free time, Jim is an avid deer hunter, and a proud father of Nicholas and Jordan. Bob, a veteran of the United States Army, is a motorcycle enthusiast and often partakes in rides for charity. Most notably America's 9/11 Ride, a ride dedicated to supporting all active first responders nationwide.

Jim Jones and Bob Pratt are integral parts of the Beth

Shalom community. They have been there to catch numerous people as they fall from grief or merely exhaustion. They are there to find you the perfect stone to place on your family member's grave. They are the people helping to lay your loved ones down in their final home. Jim and Bob truly care for everyone who comes through the gate at Mt. Carmel. When asked what the worst part of working at Mt. Carmel is, Jim responds, "It's getting to know everyone who comes to visit their loved ones. And then soon, they'll be gone too. It often feels like we are losing our friends, too."

The Importance of Cheshvan



Cheshvan, the Hebrew month immediately following Tishrei, is known in Jewish tradition as "Marcheshvan" - a pun meaning "Bitter" Cheshvan.

It is called this because it is a month with no holidays, but it follows the month with so many holidays.

Of course, for congregational clergy, there is also a certain "sweetness" as opposed to "bitterness" when we get a break from the wonderful singing, davening, dancing and eating. But aside from the tongue in cheek blessings of a break for so much work, there is real blessing in Marcheshvan.

I'd like to share a piece of a teaching I gave in synagogue on Parsashat

Congregation to Honor Gabbayim

Noach as it relates to this holy month.

There is a mysterious verse in the story of Noah. God says to Noah and his family "Leave the Ark!" Why would Noah need to be told to leave the ark? Wouldn't that be obvious?

In a lecture given in the 1980's, the Lubavitcher Rebbe, Menachem Mendel Schneerson, spoke about how the Hebrew word for "Ark" ("teivah") is the same as the Hebrew word for "word." During the entire time in the Ark, Noah was busy with the word of God.

This, Rabbi Schneerson explained, is similar to the month of Tishrei. From the listening to the shofar on Rosh HaShanah, to the fasting on Yom Kippur, to the Sukkah dwelling and

lulav shaking on Sukkot, culminating in the dancing on Simchat Torah, we spend an entire month engaged in the worship of God. Though we need Tishrei - God doesn't want us to spend the entire YEAR in Tishrei.

The purpose of our existence is to leave the Ark; to leave the place of prayer, study and holy celebration and go into the world to repair the destruction and fill it with life.

Of course, we need the time of prayer and celebration too. The learning, the praying, the dancing – this is the fuel that gives us the energy to do the sacred acts of Doud M. Chilman

not always be obvious how important the Gabbai is to the service, but to volunteer as a Gabbai is a mitzvah in the broadest sense.

So - how can you become a Gabbai? If you are post Bar/Bat Mitzvah, read Hebrew fluently and have an understanding of trope, you can attend a two-session workshop from 7:00 to 8:30 pm on the following dates:

Sunday & Thursday, Nov. 5th & 9th OR Sunday & Thursday, Nov. 12th & 16^{th} . The 12^{th} will be a repeat of the 5th and the 16th a repeat of the 9th for those who are unable to attend two sessions in the same week. Each session will be led by Hazzan Ben-Yehuda.

Peoplehood will discuss whether Judaism is primarily an ethnic or religious identity. Students will discuss how to work with Jews with whom we disagree and how to preserve their ideological integrity while understanding the perspectives of others.

The Prayerbook: New Interpretive Methods will examine the many prayers composed over the years that comprise our siddur. Students will learn what the prayers actually mean and learn to relate to them in a more personal way. Participants will look at the siddur differently and investigate the Shabbat and weekday prayers to achieve deeper meaning.



Passport to Israel - An Israel Trip Savings Program



As a member of Beth Shalom, you are entitled to sign your high school child(ren) up to participate in one of several different Israel programs. The costs of these trips continue to rise annually. Beth Shalom and the Jewish Community Foundation are aware of how expensive these trips can

be and encourage each of you to sign your children up for Passport to Israel--a saving incentive program designed to help families plan for their children's high school trips. Congregation Beth Shalom believes very strongly in its support of this program and now offers our members two ways to participate:

Option 1

From 2nd grade through 8th grade, families contribute \$150, the Congregation contributes \$50, and the Jewish Community Foundation will match this combined \$200 with another \$100 for a combined total of \$300.

Option 2

From 2nd grade through 8th grade, Congregation Beth Shalom will contribute \$100, if families will increase their contributions to \$200, and the Jewish Community Foundation will match this combined \$300, with another \$100 for a combined total of \$400. Congregation Beth Shalom has opened this program to Second Graders; however, the Jewish Community will not participate in the Second Grade contribution, but will in all subsequent years. The Beth Shalom additional funds will apply from 2nd through 8th grade only, and the community funds will only apply for 3rd through 8th grade.

Beth Shalom has established certain criteria to determine the eligibility of our students for this program. Participating families must be in good standing.
