From the Rabbi's Study

Shabbat In New, Improved and Classic Flavors!

As the New Year is underway, many may be thinking of ways to add some spirituality to their week. While it may be considered cliché for the rabbi to suggest Shabbat in our 24/7 connected world, I would argue that Shabbat has never been more necessary.

Admittedly, though, Shabbat morning services can sometimes be daunting for families with busy (and differing) schedules. Our main service in Goldsmith Hall on Shabbat morning is just one doorway into Shabbat.

Some of our services are new for this year, and others have been spruced up. I wanted to highlight some ways to connect, and also explain *what to expect*.

Shabbat Minchah-Ma'ariv-Havdalah

Time: Saturday late afternoon – exact time changes with the sunset. In October, it goes from around 6:30 to around 6:00 p.m. In the winter, it's later, in the spring and summer it's earlier.

Length: 1 Hour – 1 Hour, 15 minutes.

Ages: 11+

What to wear: Come as you are! Casual dress encouraged.

The vibe: Chill. Relaxed. Spiritual. What to expect: Though we have had Shabbat Minchah in the past, this is a new program that includes food and study. We'll begin with Minchah which is a short (20 min.) service that has an abbreviated Torah reading with three aliyot. Between Minchah and Ma'ariv (the evening service), we'll have some food, singing and a discussion on areas of personal spirituality. We finish with the evening service and Havdallah.

Time: Friday night, 6:00 p.m.

Length: 50 minutes

Ages: All ages from 0-100+ years old

What to wear: Come as you are! Casual dress encouraged.

The vibe: Upbeat. Spirited. Joyous. What to expect: Using many of the melodies of the late Rabbi Shlomo Carlebach, with the podium in the center of the congregation, join us for this family-friendly, sing-able service. A five minute dose of Torah spirituality, and you are in and out in under an hour. Keep your eyes peeled for Shabbat Dinners following some holidays.

Length: 2 hours

tional Shabbat minyan.

What to wear: Come as you are! Casual dress allowed.

The vibe: Engaged. Singing. Com-

What to expect: Maybe the best kept secret in Jewish KC.... For over twenty years, families and individuals who have wanted an intimate, spirited prayer experience without interruption have come together for the Library Minyan. Volunteers do everything here including the D'var Torah (a 5-7 minute teaching), and a full Torah Reading. If you are looking

to have that "family feel," a relaxed environment to try out your prayerleading or Torah-reading skills or just a place for introspective Shabbat prayer, this could be a great place for you.

Congregation Beth Shalom Shabbat Morning

Time: Saturday, 9:30 a.m.

Length: 2 hours, 15 minutes

Ages: All ages welcome for this traditional Shabbat service, but we also have Youth Services and child-care available.

What to wear: From business casual to more formal.

The vibe: Communal. Celebratory. Engaging.

What to expect: We've tightened up the service, so that we usually end by 11:45 a.m. Also, our prayer leaders and Torah readers are all volunteers. There is a fifteen minute teaching, bringing timeless Torah wisdom into today's world. Children come up to the bimah for the concluding prayers. We often celebrate Bar or Bat Mitzvah ceremonies, and other life-cycle events. This service is officiated by Rabbi Glickman.


Buy a Ticket and Get a Mitzvah



During the 1850s, the Baltimore Hebrew Congregation, in order to alleviate its financial stresses and maintain decorum. imposed a structure of fines for its congregants. Singing louder than the Hazzan, taking off one's tallit before the completion of services

and leaving the sanctuary while the Torah was read were among the infractions that generated a fine. Although many may be tempted to implement our own CBS system of fines, I believe that we have a more creative and educational fundraising idea—our 613 Mitzvot Raffle.

You have the opportunity to purchase raffle tickets for \$100 donation per ticket for a chance to

win \$10,000. We are selling up to 613 tickets representing each of the 613 Mitzvot in the Torah. Your ticket numbers will correspond to the number of the Mitzvot. Those of you who regularly come to Shul on Shabbat morning know that we feature a different mitzvah each week which still is available to purchase. For instance, Mitzvah number 212 (one of my favorites) from Lev 19:3 commands that we shall honor and respect our parents. Mitzvah 405 from Numbers 29:1 commands that we shall hear the sounding of the Shofar on Rosh HaShanah. At the time we went to press, both of these Mitzvot remain available. This is a great way to learn a bit about the Mitzvot while supporting our congregation. The drawing for the winning ticket will take place on December 10th.

The Sanford M. Dunn Scholarship Fund for Study in Israel

Applications are now being received for the Sanford M. Dunn Scholarship for study in Israel, which is administered by the Scholarship Committee of Congregation Beth Shalom. This scholarship is available from a fund created in 1988 in memory of Sanford M. Dunn by his wife Patsy and children Daniel and Debbi.

The scholarship is awarded on the basis of merit, not financial need. Merit may be demonstrated by:

- A record of academic achievement.
- A bona fide proposal for study in Israel, as part of an established program or as an individual or original project.
- References from teachers, rabbis or similarly qualified individuals.
- Or any combination of the above.

Age of applicants is not a factor, and while they need not be affiliated with the synagogue, first preference will be given to meritorious applicants from CBS. To apply: submit the above documents to substantiate your qualifications. These documents must be received by the Beth Shalom Scholarship Committee no later than November 30, care of the Beth Shalom Administrative Office at 14200 Lamar Ave, Overland Park, Kansas 66223.



Cream Cheese Squares

Ingredients:

- 2(8 ounce) cans refrigerated crescent roll dough *
- 2 (8 ounce) packages cream cheese
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1/2 cup margarine, melted
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 egg
- 1/4 cup of sugar

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 9x13 inch pan.
- 2. Press one can of the crescent rolls into the bottom of the prepared pan. In a medium bowl, mix together the cream cheese, 1 cup of sugar, and egg until smooth and creamy. Spread over the crescent layer. Unroll the second can of crescent rolls and lay them on top of the cream cheese layer. Do not press down. Pour the melted margarine over the entire pan. Combine the remaining 1/4 cup of sugar and cinnamon; sprinkle over the top.
- 3. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes in the preheated oven, or until the top is crisp and golden.

The Rabbi Gershon Hadas Memorial Lecture

The annual Rabbi Gershon Hadas Memorial Lecture will take place Sunday, October 21, 10:00 am in Goldsmith Hall. This year's featured speaker will be Dr. Joseph P. Schultz, former director of the UMKC Danciger Chair of Jewish Studies. This stimulating learning experience will feature a dialogue between Schultz and his son, multimedia journalist Eric Schultz, of Kansas City's NBC Action News. Dr. Schultz will discuss his recently debuted books: *The Kabbalistic Journey*, and a popular version of the topic, *In Search of Higher Wisdom*. Both books will be available for sale and signing after the event.

Rabbi Joseph P. Schultz, Ph.D. served congregations in Brookline, MA., Norwich, CT and Cambridge, MA. He founded the Jewish Studies Program at Boston University where he was assistant professor of religion, and at the University of Missouri-Kansas City where he was Oppenstein Brothers Distinguished Professor of Judaic Studies. He helped establish the Center for Religious Studies, a consortium of six colleges' theological schools and the University of Missouri-Kansas City, offering an interdisciplinary graduate program for the Ph.D. in Religious Studies. Dr. Schultz was its first director. He has written numerous articles and is the author or editor of seven books. One of these books is a history of the Kansas City Jewish community entitled Mid-America's Promise

which Dr. Schultz edited and to which he contributed. He received his B.A. degree in English Literature from Yeshiva University, his rabbinic ordination and Masters of Hebrew Literature from the Jewish Theological Seminary of America and his Ph.D. in Near Eastern and Judaic Studies from Brandeis University. He lives with his wife Bella in Brookline, MA.
