LINDA LESSNER was bat mitzvah and confirmed at Congregation Beth Shalom. She was honored as a "Woman of Valor" at the annual Torah Fund Luncheon. Linda was a recipient of the Sisterhood Past Presidents' Leadership Recognition Award.

In addition to being Sisterhood President from 2011-2013, she was Sisterhood Membership V.P., Sisterhood Education Co-V.P. and assisted with the Torah Fund Campaign and annual luncheon. Linda has Co-Chaired both the Sisterhood/Congregational calendar and the Sisterhood Annual Movie Event. She has also volunteered in the Sisterhood Gift Shop. Currently, Linda is on the Sisterhood Board of Directors as chair of the Sisterhood Long Range Planning Committee.

What it Means to be “Home for the Holidays”

I am so excited for us to be
“Home for the Holidays.”

It reminds me of one of our family's favorite children's book, *The Relatives Came*, by Cynthia Rylant and illustrated by Stephen Gammell. The books, with its crisp language and whimsical illustrations recall a summer visit by far-away relatives that cram into the house. The house is full of breathing, eating, laughing and loving.

When I imagine all of us coming together on our Lamar location for the holidays, this is the image that I think of. All of us laughing, praying, hugging and breathing together. This will be the first time we have had High Holidays in our own building in practically a decade, and it will be the most people that have ever fit into our Lamar location.

But there are other qualities of what it means to be “Home for the Holidays.” The Hebrew word for home is the same as the word for house: “Bayit”.

A synagogue is three homes in one. It is a:
“Beit Keneset” – A Home for Gathering
“Beit Midrash” – A Home for Learning
“Beit Tefillah” – A Home for Praying

I pray that this year, we can truly be all of these things. But, also, I hope that we can move from “house” to “home.”

A “house” is a physical structure, with walls, doors, and property. A “home” is a place where you are welcome, accepted, rooted. Home is a place for return. Home is a place for comfort. Home is a place for embrace.

There is one additional Bayit that I hope we can become this High Holidays: a Beit Am. If you went to Jewish summer camp, or have visited Israel, then you know that a “Beit Am” is often a large gymnasium, recreation center, or performance space.

The literal definition if “Beit Am,” though is, “A Home for People.” This is my prayer for our High Holidays this year. I hope that we can be a Home for People. I pray that each person feels they can be present in their wholeness. I pray that each one who walks through our doors feels welcome and embraced in their totality.

For that to happen, we will all need to work hard to embrace and welcome home each person we see over Rosh HaShanah and Yom Kippur.

From our home to your home, my wife, Annie, and our children, Gavi, Ellie and Dani, join me in wishing everyone a very sweet new year that is overflowing with blessings.

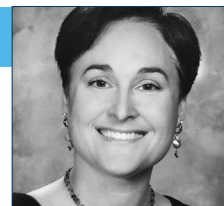

"The Road Not Taken" by Robert Frost is the story of life, a life of choices. Throughout our lives, we will always find ourselves at a fork in the road. Which fork do we take? We may decide to take the road most people travel, thinking it must be the best route. Why else would everyone take it? Or, we may decide to take the road less traveled, giving us a sense of adventure, a feeling of not being part of the crowd, a feeling of individuality.

We all must follow the path that is best for us, not best for someone else. Don't blindly follow everyone else's path; follow the path that is best for you. As that great philosopher Yogi Berra said, "When you come to the fork in the road, take it!" Yogi lived at the top of a circular road. They will assist with the music for 1st Day Rosh HaShanah, September 10th at 9:30 am and Yom Kippur Day, September 19th at 9:30 am. Both services, led by Rabbinic Student and Kansas City native David Helfand will be held in the Lower Level Prayer Space. Yachad members, Kansas City musicians who have been sharing their musical talents in various Jewish venues for over 18 years, include:

Judith Epstein (soprano) is a KC native who began her singing career in the Beth Shalom choir and was a member of the KC Civic Chorus (now The Symphony Chorus). Judith is a founding member of Yachad.

Charles Dickinson (keyboard) has a BA from Adams State University, an MM from the University of New Mexico, and an Artist's Certificate from UMKC, all in piano performance. He performs throughout Kansas City in a variety of ensembles and genres and teaches privately throughout the metro area.

Celia Arnold (cello) is a Chicago native who was principal cellist in the Skokie Valley Symphony and is an original member of Yachad. Presently, she is a member of the Overland Park Symphony Orchestra.

Andie Poisner-Corchine (alto), a member of Yachad since 2004, grew up belting out show tunes. After college she joined the musical group Up With People for their world

tour singing in a variety of languages, including Italian, Dutch, Arabic, and Swahili.

Joe Goldwasser's (percussion) parents handed him a pair of bongos in the 5th grade and said, "Now you can bang on this instead of the furniture." He played percussion in the school band through junior high and high school, spending two years in the marching band.

Carrying on her mother's legacy, Carolyn Braverman (alto), gives her mother, Myrna Braverman a founding member of Yachad, full credit for her love of music. Most people know Carolyn for her choreography and performance credits in various community theaters and schools. She and her husband Joe Goldwasser enjoy the opportunity of attending the same rehearsals.

Dr. Elizabeth Birger (soprano), is a classically trained opera singer based out of Kansas City. Elizabeth earned her doctorate at the University of Mississippi and currently performs with several local and regional companies in solo and ensemble capacities. Elizabeth's family was the first Russian Jewish family to immigrate to Kansas City in the 1970's.

Dr. Bruce Lerner (baritone), who minored in voice at Washington University, grew up at Beth Shalom hearing Cantor Rothblatt and as a college student sang with him during High Holy Day services. He has continued his involvement with Jewish music by serving as a cantorial soloist at various synagogues.

Devra Lerner (alto), a founding member of Yachad, has been involved in Jewish music for much of her life. As a teenager she was a song leader for NFTY. She has taught Jewish music in various venues throughout the United States. Before her retirement, she was Director of Jewish Music at Hyman Brand Hebrew Academy for 30 years.

As the new year begins, Beth Shalom students are building toward a better world, one midah, one class, one song at a time. And I wish you and your family - of all ages - a Shanah Tovah, a good year filled with life and love and learning.

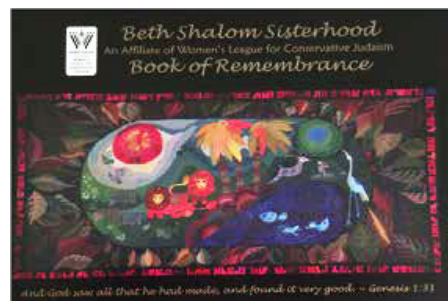

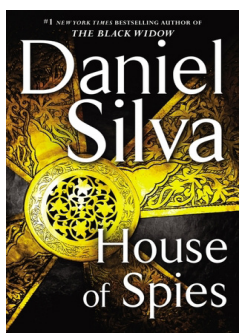
