Congregation Beth Shalom Simchat Torah Honorees Chatan Torah and Kallat Bereishit

This year Ernie Rosenthal, Chatan Torah, and Amy Schultz, Kallat Bereishit, will be honored as Congregation Beth Shalom volunteers on Simchat Torah morning. Please join us on October 22 at 9:30 am in Goldsmith Hall as we celebrate with our honorees.



Ernie Rosenthal has been an active member of Beth Shalom since he and his family returned to Kansas City in 1985. He served as Chair of the Budget, Scholarship and Membership Retention Committees, and previously was a member of these committees, as well as the Youth, Administrative, Audit, Ritual, Lechem, Chesed, Cemetery and School Committees. He served on at least one of the Rabbi, Assistant Rabbi and Executive Director Search Committees, coordinated High Holiday Honor Assignments, and assisted the Generation-to-Generation Campaign. Ernie is also an active member of Kiddush Corps.

Ernie has been a member of the Executive Committee of the synagogue and an officer of both the synagogue and the Beth Shalom Foundation. He relinquished his position as an Officer of the congregation for a nine-month period in 2004-2005 to serve as Interim Executive Director. Ernie then served as President of Beth Shalom from 2006-2008, and as Immediate Past President from 2008-2010. Since 2014 he has directed the High Holiday Appeal, and has coordinated the Cemetery Solicitation since 2012.

Ernie received his Bachelor of Science in Education from the University of Kansas, and his MBA from St. Mary's University in San Antonio while serving as an Air Force officer evaluating the effectiveness of U.S. electronic countermeasures in the air war over Vietnam. After being discharged from the Air Force he went to work for 28 years at Electronic Data Systems, where he worked as a Systems Engineer, a Proposal Manager, a Financial Analyst, Corporate Manager of Personnel and Compensation, a Customer Account Manager and a Regional Manager. Ernie and his wife, Susan were married at Beth Shalom in 1966. They have two sons, David and Daniel, two daughters-in-law, Cara and Janna; and four grandchildren, Emma, Ben, Sara and Eli.



Amy Schultz is currently Sisterhood VP of Education. In that role she is the project chair for the Peltzman Educational Series and Sisterhood Shabbat. She also serves on various Sisterhood committees. Amy also serves on Beth Shalom's Ritual Committee and plays an active role in High Holiday planning. She serves as a Beth Shalom Mashgiach and regularly participates in the Kiddush Corps. She is also a board member of the Vaad HaKashruth.

She enjoys volunteering at Ronald McDonald Family Room, Safe Home, and with the Lechem Committee, which helps to feed the hungry at Wilhelmina Gill Multi-Service Center. Amy also enjoys helping in the Rose Family Early Childhood Education Center and at Polsky Religious School as well as volunteering at HBHA. She is a member of NCJW and Hadassah.

Amy is a graduate of the University of Kansas where she earned a degree from the School of Social Work. She worked many years as the Social Work Administrator/Co-Coordinator at Social Work p.r.n. and at Sasone as a para-professional. She has worked with children in religious schools at synagogues in Kansas City for 30 years, 25 of which have been at Beth Shalom.

She has had many adult Jewish educational experiences. She studied at The Center for Technology in Tel Aviv, is a Melton graduate, and is a Kohelet Fellowship graduate from Yeshiva University's Jewish Learning Institute.

Amy is a fourth generation Beth Shalom member. She grew up at Beth Shalom, attending the preschool and religious school. She celebrated her Bat Mitzvah, participated in Confirmation, and held board positions in both USI and USY. Impermanence is the Source of Meaning and Joy

On Sukkot, the Talmud teaches us that during the festival we should "exit our

fixed dwelling, and live in our temporary dwelling – which is a sukkah."

The very essence of a Sukkah exists in its impermanence. The walls are tarps, the roof is made of branches, and the Jewish law proscribes that it need only be strong enough to withhold a normal wind (not a strong gust).

Yet, the time of Sukkot is known in our tradition as *zeman simchateinu* – the time of our joy.

We spend so much of our income on our rent or our mortgages. This doesn't even begin to count for house repairs, furniture, and upgrades. Our entire adult life is spent saving, spending, investing in our "fixed dwelling." But if we want to experience true joy – we need to leave it and go to a hut.

The reason is, dwelling in the sukkah reminds us that a house, an apartment or a condominium is actually no more permanent than a sukkah. Yes, it provides greater protection from the elements. Also, I do not want to ignore the fact

that there are millions of people in our country who are homeless or home insecure.

However, we should not fool ourselves into thinking that any physical dwelling is permanent.

Spirituality comes from the recognition that any pain and any joy is fleeting.

Sukkot comes after the High Holidays with the very powerful reminder that our days are limited. To appreciate this impermanence the most – we must strip ourselves of our feelings of permanence and intentionally put ourselves into an insecure place.

Please come to Congregation Beth Shalom this year – or to a friend's – to sit in a sukkah. It need not be long. Just have a cup of coffee or a piece of cake. Feel the breeze. Smell the branches. Know that this is but one week a year – and we only have a limited number of them.

FROM THE Director of Congregational Learning

"Music in Prayer/Prayer in Music"

As we enter the High Holy Days period, as I open my machzor again and review all the music, all the words we chant only a few days a year, I find myself transported by the tunes that strike a chord so deep inside me. These melodies and motifs that seem to us to be so critical to the holidays have the power to create feelings in so many of us – feelings of family, of togetherness, of joy or of sadness, of anticipation, of trepidation. The relationship we have to the words is augmented by the melodies, and the relationships we have with each other and with our synagogue are evoked by the melodies.

There was one teacher at the Seminary who counseled us that if we changed up all of the melodies of the Friday night service but ended with Friday night Kiddush in the "right" melody, everyone would go home feeling like it was still Shabbat. But if you came to services on Rosh HaShanah or Yom Kippur and did not hear the "right" melody for *Avinu Malkeinu* or for the beginning of the evening service, or, God-forbid, for *Kol Nidrei* you might want or even need to fire the cantor...

Part of my responsibility as your Hazzan is to provide a musical experience of prayer that helps to connect you to the words you are praying and to the occasion on which you are praying. I often thought of the music as the vehicle for the words of the prayer, but the music is sometimes itself the prayer, and the music also has the power to distract us from the words of the prayer.

For the next few months, I will be turning over and over the question "what is the role of music in prayer?" I hope that you will come talk with me or drop me an email about your answer to this question. I know there are many, many answers, and what I will leave you with for now is that in the Jewish tradition at least, public prayer is connected inexorably to musical motifs, and I am very much looking forward to immersing myself in the motifs that are sacred to the High Holiday season.

I wish you and your loved ones a sweet and a happy New Year – *Shanah Tovah Umetukah* – may you be inscribed for a good and sweet new year.
