Passover 5781/2021 – This night is still different! With more changes as well...

I don't think that any of us imagined a year ago that we would be preparing for a second Pandemic Pesach. I think we all expected that Covid would have "Passed Over" by now. In addition to the logistic and emotional difficulties of a Pandemic Pesach, there is an added complication for this year: Passover begins on Saturday night.

This is complicated because on one hand we are supposed to have our house completely rid of all leavened bread and other foodstuffs by the start of Passover. On the other hand, we are SUPPOSED to eat bread (challah) on Shabbat – and we are refraining from work on Shabbat.

On years when the first Seder falls on Saturday night after Shabbat ends, a few of our familiar rituals are on different days than usual.

Thursday, March 25, 2021

On this morning we will have our siyyum bechorim where we conclude a segment of learning. This learning celebration permits first born children to not have to fast on the Fast of the First Born. (This ritual is usually done on the morning of Erev Pesach).

Thursday evening after dark, you search for chametz in your home. (This ritual is usually done the evening before the first seder).

Friday, March 26, 2021

On this morning, we burn our chametz. Since this is the day before Passover and not Erev Pesach itself, your hametz can be burned all day. We recommend though, that you continue to burn it in the morning so that we don't get out of the habit of burning it at the correct time.

On Friday evening, your Shabbat dinner should be completely kosher for Passover and served on your Passover dishes. For Ha-Motzi, you can either have two challah rolls at a separate table, or on the empty table on disposable plates or napkins. Or, some permit using kosher for Passover egg matzo for this (which can be eaten on your Passover dishes).

Saturday, March 27, 2021 Erev Pesach

It is a mitzvah to eat challah for lunch; however we need to conclude our eating of chametz **by 10:45 am**, Saturday. What to do? We recommend eating "lunch" early with your two challot for lunch (at a separate table or on your back porch, so the challah rolls don't get chametz on your Passover dishes). For your third meal on the day (Se'udah Shlishit) it is recommended to only have eggs, vegetables, fruit and kosher for Passover sweets. Traditionally, the seder begins after sunset. In this way, we are acting out the Exodus at the time it actually occurred. Also, this year, it allows Shabbat to have its full sanctity – and Passover to have its own sanctity. If you need to begin early, try starting the story of the Haggadah first, and then doing kiddush and eating matzah after dark (8:17 pm).

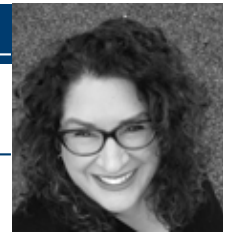

They meet monthly and it has meant so much for them to still be able to “see” each other! This month, Gary said “I have set up mystery guests that I cannot reveal but, will let you know next week. On March 7th we have the JScreen executive director doing a presentation on Genetic testing for Jewish prevalent cancers.”

B'nai Mitzvah Chesed project spotlight on Jonah Stein

For American Jews, March marks the beginning of an important season – Bar and Bat Mitzvah season! January and February are sort of dangerous months for B'nai Mitzvah, because (pre-Covid), you never knew if a winter storm might ruin the travel plans of your guests. As this Bar and Bat Mitzvah season opens up, our community will be celebrating almost every non-Pesach Shabbat with families of kids who were planning their simcha this spring, and also families who pushed their dates back because of Covid. This spring, we will celebrate 5 B'nai Mitzvah in March, 2 in April and 5 in May!

To become a Bar or Bat Mitzvah at Beth Shalom, most students learn a haftarah and a Torah reading, some or all of the Torah service, possibly other prayers, and write a D'var Torah – a talk where they teach the community something from their parsha. They either study at the Polsky Religious School or at the Hyman Brand Hebrew Academy; and there is one other requirement – they must engage in some sort of chesed project. We require students to spend at least 18 hours volunteering their time in some capacity for the benefit of others.



One upcoming Bar Mitzvah student, Jonah Stein, intended to raise money for Jewish Family Services (JFS) and the JFS food pantry, located at the JCC and their Brookside location. Recognizing that we all wear masks now, he decided to create beaded lanyards to hold our masks the way chains can hold glasses. He called his project MASKerAID, and charged \$15 per chain, hoping to raise \$1,800 for the food pantry. Jonah shared his project with family and friends, and it got more and more press on television, in print and on social media; as word of his project spread, orders came in for the beaded lanyards locally and from 33 states! To date, Jonah has spent over 375 hours creating the lanyards, and his parents and sister have put in about as much time as well. Jonah's project has raised over \$19,000 to date! Jonah shared that it was a perfect activity during Covid lockdowns and down-time. If you are interested in helping Jonah raise

Jonah elected to benefit JFS because he has been involved in volunteering at the pantry and for the pantry for a long time. Much of the money he donates will go to creating bags of ready-to-eat foods that anyone in need can pick up at the food pantry, and the rest will go directly to support the work of the food pantry. Jonah was recently selected as the Prudential Spirit of Community Awardee as the top middle school applicant from Kansas, and was recognized on FaceBook by Governor Laura Kelly.



Jonah's parents shared, "the experience has really empowered him and we have seen him grow... before our eyes. We have always wanted our kids to realize the impact they can make and our responsibility for tikkun olam and doing our part to fight injustice. We are so proud of Jonah and what he has accomplished and hope that this will inspire a lifetime of service and generosity."

The point of the chesed / mitzvah project component of becoming a Bar or Bat Mitzvah is not necessarily to raise a ton of money or to realize national fame. It is, however, to grow as a young person and to recognize that each and every one of us can make a tremendous impact on a person in need, on our community, on our environment. We grow Jewishly through the learning, mastery of and the performance of a haftarah, Torah reading and prayers, and just as important, we grow Jewishly when we dedicate some of our time and resources to acts of chesed, acts of lovingkindness towards others. These acts change the world around us, and they also change US.

Mazal tov to Jonah on his achievement, and to every single Bar and Bat Mitzvah we have celebrated this winter and will celebrate this spring. Look for information on the chesed our students have given the world on the Bar and Bat Mitzvah landing page of our website.

This is exactly the spirit I see in our Congregation Beth Shalom community and I look forward to us creating that future together.

In my last article I indicated that we have 55 families that have established Legacy Gifts. They are written commitments from our members pledging funds to Beth Shalom at a later date. Most donors, direct that the proceeds be paid upon their death or at another time of their choice. The funds are either distributed by a grant in their estate plan or through direction to an organization, like the Jewish Community Foundation, that holds their charitable funds.

There are donors that specify an amount of the gift, or they establish a percentage of their estate/fund that they wish Beth Shalom to receive.

All significant amounts are either added to the corpus of our foundation or upon the desire of the donor they may establish a perpetual fund for a purpose of their choice.

Funds have been established for a particular purpose. Many have indicated our school, our youth department, Beth Shalom Cemetery or similar programs. Some donors have

designated funds for large maintenance projects or routine activities such as Shabbat dinners or kiddush.

Several of our members own life insurance policies that were taken out at a young age to protect their family, if they were to have passed at a young age. The proceeds from these policies are often times pledged to our synagogue to establish a Legacy Gift.

With great anticipation we are nearing the completion of our Create campaign that will fund the development and building of our new sanctuary. Legacy Gifts will be used to perpetuate the ritual, programs and operations congregation.
