*With this in mind—all Beth Shalom firstborn are invited to join us for services and a siyyum (celebration) as we complete a tractate of Talmud.*

## The Torah Begins and Ends with Lovingkindness

### *A Reminder As We Move from Purim to Passover*

Our Talmud (Sotah 14a) teaches that the Torah begins with lovingkindness ("Hesed" in Hebrew) and ends with lovingkindness. One of the first actions that God takes in Genesis is to clothe the naked Adam and Eve. One of God's final acts is to bury Moses. Hesed is more than just "being a good person." **It is recognizing that there is a Divine trait of mercy that we, as humans made in God's image, can also emulate. We grow in this capacity through increased empathy toward the other. The more that we can truly understand the need and the pain of the other, the better equipped we can be to do acts of Hesed.**

Unlike other mitzvot, acts of Hesed are more than only an obligation. The prophet Micah says that we are supposed to love doing Hesed. The Talmud says that, unlike other types of mitzvot, there is no limit to the amount of Hesed we can do.

Each holiday has its own unique acts of Hesed that are attached to it. On Purim we sent mishloach manot (gifts of food) to our neighbors and matanot l'evyonim (monetary gifts to the poor). On Pesach, we begin our Seder with the words "All who are hungry, come and eat," and we give maot hitin (money for wheat) as we sell our hametz (leavened

food) before the holiday even begins. In the tenth chapter of the Mishnah that deals with the laws of Seder night, before the Mishnah even teaches us one rule about the Seder it says that we should take funds from communal charities to make sure that even the poorest Jew has four cups of wine.

As we think about our Passover celebrations ahead, which might include the first gathering in two years for the holiday, let us also think about organizations like JFS, Kosher Meals on Wheels, and others that help individuals get through the holidays. And, like the instruction from the Prophet Micah, let us try to bring out these acts of Hesed from the deepest places of love that we have within us.

Your family is invited to join us to learn the story of Passover at this year's Junk Food Seder! This event is free and open to the community and is for children of all ages.

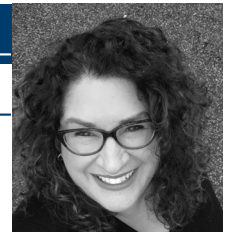

The architects are working on the final construction drawings, and we plan to submit those drawings to the City of Overland Park in late Spring. The City will then issue a building permit. We hope to begin actual construction in late Summer or early Fall. We anticipate completion of the sanctuary in the Fall of 2023, depending on the availability of materials and labor, both of which fluctuate.

We have raised over \$13 million for this project thanks to the generosity of so many congregants. We are still fundraising, however, to ensure that our endowment has enough funds to

cover future maintenance expenses for the new building. If you have not made a pledge to the fundraising campaign, we welcome your participation. ## Rising Song Returns!

A story is told of the Baal Shem Tov, the 17th century Ukrainian founder of Hassidic Judaism: The Baal Shem Tov was traveling from one small town in Ukraine to another with his students, and every evening they would hope to sleep the night in a small shul in whatever town they were in that night. One particularly cold late afternoon, they came upon a small village and found its simple synagogue. Standing in the snow outside the door of the shul, the Baal Shem Tov hesitated, focusing on the building as his students shivered. Finally, one of them approached him and asked, Master, can we enter? The Baal Shem Tov turned to his students and said to them, I am sorry, but we cannot enter here - this shul is full of prayers. His students looked at him puzzled - but if this place is full of prayers, is it not the perfect place for us to stay the night? No, their teacher replied - in this place, the prayers of the people do not ascend to God's throne. They are stuck here. This is not a place for us to stay.

**We want to elevate our prayers so that our shul never resembles that sad shul in the story. There are so many wonderful melodies, from the Old Country as well as from Israel and from America,**

**written in the last 100 years as well as written in the last 10 years. The Hadar Institute in New York created a program called Rising Song, led by Joey Weisenberg, that promotes and helps to teach new melodies so that congregations like ours can continue to enliven and deepen our prayers. Last year, I led a small group in learning a dozen or so new melodies that we now use in Friday night and Shabbat morning services. In the next few weeks, we will resume learning new melodies, as our Rising Song group resumes.**

If you are a regular shul-goer and you'd like to learn some wonderful new melodies, or if you love to sing and to pray and you would consider coming to shul more often since you'll know some wonderful tunes to our prayers, I hope you will join us in Rising Song. ## Minyan

Daily minyan serves as bookends to the daily spiritual life of Jewish congregations. As a place for mourners to remember their loved ones by saying Kaddish in their memory, daily minyan serves as a vehicle to help mourners emerge from grief and re-engage with the world of our Jewish community. Minyan also serves to help all of us start and end the day with prayer, helping to "center" us as we face the challenges of daily life.

But only if we have ten Jewish adults participating... The number ten can be traced all the way back to the "Assembly" to which God refers in Numbers 14:27. Since then, a minyan has served to strengthen our sense of connection to the prayers, and thus to God, through communal cohesion.

During Covid, Zoom has made it easier to achieve a minyan each morning and evening, but ... recently, with the completion of the period of mourning of several mourners, we have struggled to achieve a daily minyan each morning, even on Zoom. Many people have stepped up, increasing the number of days they attend, but we are still short many days.

An ad hoc planning group was empaneled consisting of two members each from the Board, Ritual Committee, Sisterhood, Men's Club, Ohev Shalom and morning minyan regulars. The group brainstormed ideas to help our congregation achieve a daily minyan each morning.

We will each receive a personal invitation - watch for it. There will be periodic announcements - watch for them. Someone may call you - respond to them. There will be congregational recognition events - participate in them. Choose one day to experience minyan and you will be helping mourners manage their grief that day. See for yourself the value of morning meditation through Hebrew prayer and how it can help center you by refocusing ... even one day a week.

There are some things that can only be done together. We need you right now. You can be a valued part of morning minyan. Once a year (on your birthday, and/or on the anniversary of the yahrtzeit of a family member?), once a month, once a week ... Together we can fulfill this mitzvah for our congregation, and specifically for others who depend on us so that they may say Kaddish.
