A Home Being Built for Torah

Rabbi Shlomo Carlebach had a teaching that the organization, Hazon (a Jewish environmental organization that has since consolidated into the organization "Ad-

amah") claimed as its motto: The Torah is a commentary on the world, and the world is a commentary on the Torah.

This teaching has been resonating inside of me as I have been watching the progress of our new building inside and out. As the design of our new sanctuary was in its infancy, our architect, Preston Scott Cohen, was seeking out authentic Jewish geometric forms. We talked about the different artistic shapes that defined the history of the Jewish people – some were too abstract and others too kitsch.

The shape that began to emerge was that of an unrolling Torah scroll. We understood that the reason why a synagogue exists is not simply to pray together, but to be engaged in Torah together. To be engaged in Torah

is to be engaged in study to be sure – but Torah is also about life instruction. Torah is also about a community coming into proximity with the Divine. Torah is also about the Jewish people engaging with one another.

The central object that makes a sanctuary unlike any other space is the Aron HaKodesh – the Holy Ark.

It is physical presence of Torah that qualitatively changes the space from mundane to sacred. When you think about it, a synagogue is an Ark for the Ark. It is a building that houses a building that houses the Torah.

As the teams of holy workers build all the aspects of our sanctuary in the construction site, you can see from miles around (literally) that a Torah is arising from the top of our hill at 14200 Lamar Ave. Many members of our community have shared with me how this has inspired them seeing this Jewish shape visible as they drive on Lamar or 143rd Street. One member of our community, shared with me that it is not simply a Torah – it is angled in way to re-

semble someone doing hagba'ah (when you lift the Torah scroll) in services.

In early December, I traveled to New Holland, PA – about an hour's drive through Amish country from Philadelphia. I drove there with Carl, one of our primary architects. We got to visit the century-old woodworking factory that is constructing our community's ark. They had spent dozens of human-hours building a mock-up of what the real ark will become. They wanted to make sure that the measurements were just right, that the angles held the Torah scrolls safely, and that it was possible to lift the scrolls in and out. I got to see how the Torah scrolls on the side rested a few inches shorter than the center scroll so that someone in a wheelchair could easily kiss the scroll if they had the honor of opening the ark.

While we were there, Carl recalled a conversation with a member of our synagogue who remembers visiting the



grand ark in the 95th Street building with Rabbi Margolies as a preschool student. Rabbi Margolies told the gathered youngsters looking up at the scrolls in their fineries: "These are our kings and our queens. They

are the royalty of the congregation."

This building and this ark is part of a broader mission, though. The shape is to remind us that we will strive to be a community where Torah embraces us, and we will also strive to be a community that embraces Torah. Torah will be a commentary on our lives in this space, and our lives in this space will- hopefully- become a commentary on Torah

A Surprising Take-Away from the Solidarity Mission to Israel

I spent the last week of November visiting Israel with nine of my colleagues. We got on the plane wearing t-shirts that read "Yachad nashir, Yachad nenatze'ach" - I had no idea how relevant the slogan would be.

I don't have enough room in this Scroll article to tell you all about the trip. If you missed my presentation on Sunday, December 17, let's make a coffee date and I will talk with you about the trip. What I want to share now, though, is one story in particular. It was Thursday, November 30, the last day of the trip. We left Jerusalem before 8 am to head to Tel Aviv's Ichilov hospital to visit more wounded and recovering Israelis, soldiers and civilians. After visiting two men, we went to a waiting area on the floor we were on, and we did what we did everywhere we went – we introduced ourselves – cantors from Conservative synagogues all over America – and we began to sing. We sang a prayer for the return of hostages, we sang Kol Ha'olam Kulo, that the whole world is a narrow bridge and the key is to not be afraid. We sang songs for peace, and we sang songs of hope. We sang Debbie Friedman's Mi Sheberach, too. We sang Am Yisrael Chai and Adon Olam.

And they sang with us. They engaged with us. When we were finished singing, they came to us individually and they told us their stories and the stories of their loved ones

in the hospital. They told us about children they lost on October 7, and about children and partners they nearly lost who are now recovering.

Then a soldier, maybe 30 years old, in sweatpants and a t-shirt, walking with a cane, said, in careful, clear English, wait – "I want to say something. I was one of the fighters in Gaza. In general, we always cherish the love of the U.S. and your support – everything you do, it gets to the fighters out there trying to defend Israel and trying to maintain sanity... so thank you. And you too, with all that you are dealing with antisemitism...we think about you, too! We have the good fortune that you are our friends, our family."

We questioned whether or not we would be welcome or if we would be a burden here in Israel. And he responded, "no – you are making an impact on the wounded, you band us together. You make us stronger".

Together we will sing. Together we will win – little did we know that the most important part of our slogan wasn't singing or winning – it was YACHAD – TOGETHER.

Dear Members of Congregation Beth Shalom,

I hope this message finds you well. As we continue to prioritize the safety and well-being of our congregation, the Security Committee has been actively working on various initiatives to enhance our security measures. It is important to note the synagogue building itself, clergy, and staff, have had a security program in place for many years. We are not starting from square one. Rather, we are endeavoring to review existing policies, alter or implement policies where appropriate, to target harden our facility and congregation. The committee is comprised of Jeremy Antes, Randy Katcher, Neil Miller, Louis Cohn, Joel Levine, Sam Raiche, and Fran Kanter.

Situational Awareness Training Success: On November 16, we conducted a highly successful situational awareness training session with Chuck Green, which saw participation from more than 30 congregants. One significant takeaway from this event was the expressed desire for ongoing education and familiarization with our building's floor plan. To address this, we are seeking volunteers who would be willing to lead tours once or twice monthly after Kiddush on Shabbat. Your involvement in this crucial aspect of security is essential, and we encourage those interested to step forward.

Curriculum Development: We have had discussions with the Overland Park Police Department to provide a few classes we hope to schedule in early 2024, perhaps to hold one per month for congregants to attend as schedules allow. The classes are anticipated to focus on things such as active shooter training and usher training.

Enhanced Morning Minyan Security: To tighten security measures, the procedure for morning minyan has been adjusted. Security personnel will now be onsite 15 minutes before minyan starts to facilitate the opening of the building. Building access is only at the main entrance.

NSGP Initiative and Target Hardening: Joel Levine and Sam Raiche are spearheading our efforts to obtain a NSGP in 2024. The initiative kicked off with a Zoom meeting led by SCN on November 16. The next step involves a walkthrough of the building with Chuck Green, Stef, committee members Sam and Joel on January 3 to assess and determine areas for "target hardening" the facility.

Background Checks and Security Guard Policies: We are actively reviewing our practices, as well as those of our subcontractors, such as A.L. Huber, especially concerning background checks for individuals working on our sacred space and entering the existing building. A policy has already been developed and put into place to ensure trades working in the building have a procedure to follow. Additionally, we are scrutinizing the policies and procedures of our security guard company to ensure they align with our security objectives.

Cybersecurity Policies and Best Practices: Recognizing the increasing importance of cybersecurity, the committee is conducting research on best practices and policies in this area. Our goal is to establish robust cybersecurity measures to safeguard our congregation's digital assets and information.

Guard-to-Congregant Ratios: Ensuring an optimal ratio of guards to congregants is vital for effective security. The committee is researching and evaluating best practices to develop a comprehensive policy that addresses this critical aspect of our security plan.

Finally, through an initiative led by Chuck Green and the Jewish Federation of Greater Kansas City, the Kansas Highway Patrol will be touring Beth Shalom, as well as other Jewish Institutions, proactively with a K9 unit and KHP vehicles to provide preventative explosive sweeps around the exterior of the building.

Your engagement and support in these efforts are paramount. If you have any questions, suggestions, or would like to volunteer for specific initiatives, please feel free to reach out to Jeremy Antes or any member of the Security Committee.

Together, we can continue to strengthen the safety and security of our congregation. Thank you for your ongoing commitment to our community.

Many thanks to our diligent Kiddish Corps team for helping to manage our Saturday morning meals and keep us fed, a plan which was reinvigorated by Rhea Salasche and Gertie Epstein in 2002. Prior to that time, Congregation Beth Shalom only offered challah and wine/grape juice at Shabbat services. We are grateful for what was provided then and what has evolved since.

But, how did we get to today's special meal planning? Rhea (while dating Harold Kaseff) attended Shabbat services alternating between Congregations Beth Shalom and Ohev Sholom. After observing other congregations hosting full Shabbat nosh, Rhea and Gertie approached Rabbi Alan Cohen and then Congregation President Jeannette Wishna (z''l) and strongly encouraged Beth Shalom and allow them to prepare and serve a full kiddish to the congregation following Shabbat services (to which the leadership approved).

Rhea and Gertie recruited other volunteers, including Debra Rubin, Elaine Singer, Alice Bordy, and Barbara Katz. Harold joined the group as a volunteer in 2004. When folks retired or shifted to part-time, Harold (with help from Rabbi David Glickman), recruited even more people increasing the group today to over 30 volunteers.

With the invaluable assistance of Barbara Katz and Bill Shapiro, Harold continued managing the volunteer group with Rhea (who assisted when needed). After nineteen years, Harold has now decided to retire from his leadership role with this group.

Effective January 1, 2024, Amy Schultz will be assuming the leadership as chairperson of the Kiddish Corps with the assistance of Todd Hollander, Elaine Friedman, and Bill Shapiro, Kim Matsil (purchasing), and Harold on an "as needed" basis.




