Every member of the Congregation Beth Shalom community—anyone who pays dues; volunteers time and energy; invests in capital campaigns or fundraising events; enrolls students in preschool or religious school; and/or participates in our wide range of programming—is considered an honored "donor." Each of us contributes to the life of our synagogue, usually in more ways than one.

Some member families have taken it upon themselves to help ensure that our congregation remains financially sound. In 2005, Beth Shalom established a special program, Pillars of the Congregation, to honor those whose annual support—through dues and High Holiday Appeal contributions—surpasses the highest suggested level of membership. Perhaps you have noticed the names listed in the glass case in the foyer outside Goldsmith

Hall. These 43 Pillar families (at latest count) represent 6% of the synagogue's membership and account for nearly 40% of the dues.

This year, Beth Shalom is taking efforts to reinvigorate our Pillars program. In addition to simply seeing their names on a wall (and showcased in listings during High Holy Day publicity), Pillars will enjoy special appreciation events that offer opportunities to build deeper connections—spiritually and socially—with our community, beginning this spring.

Our family decided to become Pillars in 2018. It began as a way to honor my late parents, Jeanette and Sheldon Wishna, and to carry on their commitment to Beth Shalom. However, we quickly came to see it as an obligation to our own present and the future. It only made sense that we should increase our support to match what Beth Shalom means to our family—emotionally, spiritually, socially, and prac-

tically, on a weekly basis. And once we took stock of what we considered our fair share of dues and our capacity for giving, the step "up" to Pillar was not a particularly daunting one.

Anyone who has so much as driven by Beth Shalom knows that we are, literally, building for the future. Our new sacred space represents a larger forward momentum, as we continue to solidify the bonds of our recent consolidation with Ohev Sholom, welcome Rabbi Talia Kaplan as our full-time assistant rabbi this summer, and more. Knowing that our family is a small (though now slightly larger) part of the foundation on which we will see our future grow is its own reward.

A Dynamic Seder Practice

Join us for the Women's Purim Seder: March 26

Many of us may feel that our Seder must be a certain way, but the way of the seder is change.

Most of us likely have precious memories of our parents' or grandparents' sederim, and deviating from that might be a tough sell. Perhaps you remember a Seder that was largely in Hebrew or even in Yiddish, perhaps there was lots of singing and huge fresh-cut pieces of horseradish, or perhaps you remember the corny

jokes that your dad or grandfather told Every. Single. Year. Maybe you remember holiday foods that were made with love year after year. You might even remember your family cleaning the kitchen and the entire house beforehand. It is that emotional memory that makes tradition so special, so important.

For me, the perfect seder features my mom's knadelach (matzah balls), my father's resonant voice leading all of us in so many songs, and my siblings and me having fun with most of the English readings, doing expressive acting out of the rabbis who managed to turn the 10 plagues into 250 plagues! The house smells like a feast awaits, and I know that you could eat off the floor – or any other surface.

Some of my most vivid core memories revolve around the Passover Seder, but the seder was never meant to be a static expression of Jewish practice. It is completely kosher, and possibly even incumbent upon us to revisit the seder ahead-of-time year after year to continue to make sure it is meaningful to us so that every generation can connect to it the



way we were able to when we were young.

Our seder is impoverished by the trend to shorten it in the hope to make it feel more accessible to children as well as to adults who don't have the same level of Jewish learning as our parents or grandparents, or who are more removed from our Jewish spiritual life than generations past. Even sadder, it cheats our children from the same opportunities to connect emotionally with the experience. Instead of shortening your seder, there are amazing resources available from

your shul and online that you can use to make meaning-ful modern connections to each of the different aspects of the seder. There are websites that will help you to create a new hagaddah just for your family that includes readings that will stoke conversation at your table and provide the children with opportunities to engage. Rabbi Glickman, Rabbi Kaplan, and I are available to you if you need resources.

On March 26, the Sisterhood will host a Women's Seder. We will use the format of a seder for the program, but it will be very different from a typical Passover seder. The theme of our seder will be the evolution of freedom especially for women in the context of Jewish history, and the increased responsibility and power of women in our communities. Women, daughters, and granddaughters are invited to participate in this seder, to lift our voices and our spirits together, to prepare for Passover, and to celebrate ourselves and the women who came before us in the grand tradition of the evolution of the Passover Seder.
