Feel the Bitterness and Eat It Anyway: A Seder Beyond Shtick

Rebbe Nachman of Breslov wrote: “But no matter how far you have fallen, it is still forbidden to give up hope. Repentance (*teshuvah*) is higher even than the Torah – therefore there is absolutely no place for despair.”

It is easy to say these words with the benefit of hindsight. We often say aphorisms like “things turn out for the best,” after we are on the other side of hardship. But when we are in the midst of hardship, a positive outcome is not obvious.

Susan Jeffers, an American psychologist titles her book on living with anxiety, “Feel the fear and do it anyway.” In other words – action and pain, fear and choice, can both live within us. The mitzvah of maror is to actually taste the bitterness itself. On the night of seder, we need to eat the maror with a blessing before we eat the satisfying meal. We literally thank God for commanding us to eat bitterness, before we eat the festive meal that has no unique blessing unto itself.

The teaching of Rebbe Nachman about despair teaches us not to look over and or ignore pain. Rather, even within a dark space, we feel bitterness we ought not have despair. Despair is not the feeling of pain, it is the lack of hope for any betterment in the future.

This Pesach, I encourage us to do what we can to be as fully present as possible within our seders. Taste the bitterness of the maror. Experience the salty wetness and



crunch of the karpas. Allow your tongue to savor the sweetness of the haroset, even while the food in your mouth has the feel of mud. Really ask one another “Why is this night different from all the other nights?” Strive to see yourself, “as if” we were taken out Egypt.

I have heard many times complaints that a Passover seder is too long or too boring. The reaction to this is often: make it short and fun. Though the opposite of long is short, the opposite of boring is not fun. The oppo-

site of boring is engaging. Engagement comes from really getting to know the guests around your table and hearing their Exodus story. Engagement comes from imagining yourself at all-night study sessions like the rabbis describe, and thinking of what would be so powerful in the Jewish story that you would stay up all night for it.

Getting to the emotional heart of the words of the seder won't come only from creating games and purchasing toys to entertain the guests. Use this time – this year of all years – to get to the heart of the matters that lie deep within our people's story. Don't be afraid to talk about the painful parts, and don't be embarrassed to celebrate the joyful parts. Our people will need engaging, meaningful, painful and inspiring stories to move us beyond the moment of now – and we will need you to craft these stories with the people you love this Passover.

We Must Face Discomfort to Grow

Imagine that you are on a road trip headed to the Grand Canyon, to which you have never been before. You have heard that the views are breathtaking, that no picture can do it justice. You arrive at the park, leave your car, and begin to walk toward a lookout point.



You slow your pace as you approach the edge, the railing that keeps you safely on the top of the cliff, and you look out at the vast chasm before you. You look out and slightly down and contemplate the beauty, the colors, the textures that lie before you. You are terrified and at the same time, transfixed.

To an educator, this is the perfect metaphor for the Proximal Zone of Development, PZD. Your PZD is the edge of your own knowledge – everything you know is the safe flat area behind you - where your car is parked, the road that brought you here. Everything you do not yet know is before you – the breathtaking view, the colors, the textures, so close you can imagine being there, but you have not yet experienced it. THIS is the exciting moment, when you realize that what is before you is beyond your reach and also within your grasp if you just take one... more... step...

According to this metaphor, you continuously approach the cliff as you learn, and the square footage of land behind you keeps increasing as you walk forward, always so close to the edge of the cliff. Continuing to move forward in that place of slight discomfort but also curiosity enough to propel you forward is called LEARNING.

Pesach begs us to learn, as we are encouraged to ask questions of each other and ourselves. If you find your seder to be boring, I encourage you to take it upon yourself to move (at least some of) your seder to the cliff! Find that place where you are uncomfortable enough to wonder at the flavor and texture of what you might just learn! Invite other adults at the table to ask hard questions. And remember – you don't have to have the answers. Sometimes just asking the questions and pondering the possibilities is satisfying enough.
