“KOL DICHFIN”

The Important Opening Words of the Seder

The Seder opens with the words *Kol Dichfin Yayti V'yeichol*. Clunky in our mouths because they are written in Aramaic, this phrase means “All who are hungry come and eat.” In some ways, this opening of the seder is either performative or mocking. Why should we invite others to come and eat at the precise moment when we are sitting down to start our seder?

On the night of the seder, at the time of sitting down, there are rarely passersby in the neighborhood who would come over! Also, at that time, our tables are set, the food is cooked, people who have a place for seder are seated somewhere – those without are tragically hungry and alone.

This opens the seder for a couple of reasons. The first is that it is like all of the other mitzvot of Passover – the cleaning for *chametz*, the preparation of the kitchen, the creation of the seder. Though we celebrate each element on the night of the seder – we have been preparing each element



for days or weeks. So too with guaranteeing food to the hungry. For us to fulfill the dictum of “All who are hungry, come and eat,” we need to work hard in the weeks prior to ensure that there is enough food for folks to have on the holiday.

The second reason we say it at a time when we do, is it serves as a humbling moment. We are to begin the seder in disgrace and conclude with praise of God. By starting the entire seder with the words “All who are hungry...” reminds us of the state of

brokenness we continue to live in, and the need for us all to do better next year. No matter how hard we work to ensure food for those who need, there may still be hungry people in our communities at the time of our seder.

During times of economic insecurity, this mitzvah of *Kol Dichfin / All who are hungry* becomes even more relevant and pressing. Whether it is through financial contributions or human connections, we may not eliminate the challenge of hunger, but we can minimize it.

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Join Beth Shalom for Tikkun Olam

The rabbis of the Talmud—the central proto-legal Jewish corpus—teach that we are responsible for speaking out against injustice at the household, city, and global levels. While much can be said about this teaching, I am particularly struck by the rabbis' choice to begin with the hyper-local. We often find ourselves more attuned to injustice happening on national or global stages, yet may be less aware of the issues right in our own backyard. For instance, HUD data from a few years ago revealed that on any given night, at least 180 individuals in Johnson County are homeless.

When people ask how to navigate this moment of hyperpolarization, rising attacks on marginalized communities, and financial anxiety, I frequently return to the idea of acting locally. There's no magic formula or simple answer to many thoughtful questions about how to create meaningful change, but one initiative in particular energizes me. Let me explain why.

Just a few years ago, the Johnson County Board of Commissioners stated that Johnson County, which lacked emergency outpatient mental health resources, would likely not see a crisis stabilization center before 2029. A nascent group called the Good Faith Network was not content with that. This group, which Beth Shalom under the leadership of Rabbi Glickman, joined at its inception, is made up of over 30 churches, synagogues, and mosques in Johnson County. That crisis stabilization center, which was expected to take another three or four years to materialize? Thanks in large part to the organizing power of the Good Faith Network, it is now slated to open within the next year.

The Good Faith Network, one of

five affiliates of the Direct Action and Research Training Center (DART) in Kansas, works across religious lines on non-partisan issues that enjoy broad consensus: currently homelessness and affordable housing, mental health, and eldercare. These five organizations operate on the county level using a strategy that has proven successful in local communities across the country: identifying one aspect of an issue to tackle, researching best practices in other communities, developing proposals in consultation with local experts, and securing commitments – and follow through – from elected leaders to support these proposals. The Good Faith Network

harnesses the power of organized people—hundreds of members from faith communities in Johnson County—to demonstrate to local elected officials the widespread support for these causes.

At times, making public asks of elected officials can feel uncomfortable. But us showing up as a unified, powerful voice helps local leaders take courageous stances and hold them accountable for following through. Rabbi Andrew Pepperstone of a sibling organization in Wichita recently shared in the Kansas Reflector, “We’re not coming to them protesting the problem. We’re coming to them with research and effective solutions. It’s never going to devolve into booing or jeering. It’s going to be professional and persistent.” In fact, members of the Good Faith Network meet with elected officials before the big community gathering in May to prepare them for the conversations that will take place. There are no surprises.

So, will you join me at this year’s major gathering? In order to do our part—to show up in proportion to our community’s size within the network—we aim to bring 50 people from Beth Shalom to the Nehemiah Assembly, the big community gathering, at 6 pm on Tuesday, May 6. How is this Passover Different from all of the other Passovers?

This year, Passover begins on Saturday Night. This happens rarely. When this happens, we prepare our homes for Passover early. Here are a few ways that we can handle the complexity surrounding this timing.

Thursday Morning 4/10/2025: *Siyum Bechorim* / “Fast” of the First born. First born children would normally fast on Erev Pesach (the day when the seder begins at night). However, we neither fast on Shabbat nor Friday, so this ritual is pushed back until Thursday morning.

Thursday Night 4/10/2025: Though we usually search for Chametz (leavened product) by candlelight on the night before the seder, on years like this we do it two days prior since we do not do this search on Shabbat.

Friday Morning 4/11/2025: We usually burn and nullify our chametz on the day we will have seder at nightfall. We make it a day earlier on years like this. However: after burning the chametz, you set aside two challah rolls to eat on Friday night. Don't put the challah rolls near your Passover dishes – keep them in a separate location!

Friday Evening 4/11/2025: We eat our Friday night Shabbat dinner completely prepared for Passover except for the Challah. We will not put the challah on the table because everything is Passover-ready. I suggest having your ha-motzi in a separate room (back porch, basement, etc.) to avoid crumbs! Some families take all the crumbs and flush them down the toilet!

Saturday Day 4/12/2025: It is customary to not eat Matzah until Passover begins after sunset, so folks will eat “Egg Matzo” which is neither “chametz” (leavened food), nor technically Matzah since it is made with eggs instead of water.

Saturday Night 4/12/2025: It is customary to wait until after dark before your first cup of wine and eating matzah. For those with small children, you may want to either use Egg Matzo for them prior to dark, or do the story telling parts of the Haggadah early and eat the Passover Matzah as late as possible before bedtime.

Fast of the Firstborn – A Family Tradition

Erev Pesach – the day of the eve of Passover – is a day called the Fast of the Firstborn. Firstborn children fast acknowledging that were it not for God's saving of the Israelites, they too would have perished with the plague of the first born in ancient Egypt.

Since fasting before a holiday is difficult, there is a near universal custom of having a "Siyum" which is the celebration of a completion of Jewish study that is followed by a festive meal. This festive meal allows first born children to avoid the fast. This is known as a "Siyum Bechorim" – the Completion Celebration for Firstborn Children.

This year, we have two sponsors for our festive breakfast. Bradley Friedman is the firstborn son of Gary Friedman z"l, and has been coming to this service ever since childhood with his grandfather, Bernard Birnbaum. Jered Nussbaum is the

firstborn son of Larry Nussbaum z"l, and has been coming to this service since childhood with his father, Larry. This contribution remembers Gary and Larry who passed away this year, and honors Bernard who is an annual attendee of this breakfast.
