

Navigating Winter Holidays and Alcohol

Though we just finished our big Jewish holiday season stretching from Rosh HaShanah through Simchat Torah, we are about to enter the winter holiday season of Thanksgiving through January 1st.

Every set of holidays has its own joys – and its own set of challenges and landmines. These challenges are different for every individual. For folks who struggle with substance use disorder or

alcohol dependence, the winter holidays can be particularly dicey.

I am not implying that alcohol is absent from Shabbat and Jewish holidays, but for many individuals, alcohol plays a larger role at Thanksgiving, office and social "holiday" parties, and New Years. At Beth Shalom, I would say that we have a "middle of the road" culture with alcohol. We neither have a culture where we are alcohol-free (which could make life easier for those who struggle with alcohol dependence), nor are we a synagogue where we see heavy drinking as a major part of our celebrations.

In most studies, the Jewish community does not have rates of substance use disorder significantly higher than the rest of the Jewish community. What is higher, though, is the amount of stigma attached with addiction and alcohol abuse. Some of the stigma comes from our own narrative. Jewish communities historically looked down on drunkenness and often associated it with the non-Jewish communities.

For contemporary American Jews, the stigma can also come from having participated in the world of addiction recovery through the 12-Step Program. The



12-Step Program is a spiritually-based recovery program that is fully consistent with Jewish beliefs. However, since the 12-Step program believes in "a Power greater than ourselves" that is defined as "God as we understood Him." In America, Jews make up less than 2% of the population, so most 12-step groups sound non-Jewish... even if the steps are compatible with Judaism at their core.

I first encountered the wisdom of the 12-step program when I was in an Al-Anon group while living in Jerusalem. Al-Anon is for individuals who have a loved one struggling with addiction. Because I was in Jerusalem, every single member of the group was Jewish. I got very lucky. Though we had all types of religious practice in that group, we had a similar understanding of a Jewish version of "God as we understood Him."

As we begin to navigate the winter holidays, if you have a loved one who is nervous about navigating the landmines of "Latkes and Vodkas," office parties, and New Years... know that they don't need to handle this on their own. There is professional guidance through Jewish Family Services (jfskc.org/services/mental-health-education/) as well as FirstCall (FirstCallKC.org). Gratitude as Practice: Jewish

Today, it's common for wellness articles or Instagram posts to suggest getting natural sunlight or having your morning cup of coffee before scrolling on your phone. The idea of a morning ritual is woven into Judaism, even preceding our morning prayer service. One of the customs upon waking is to say Modeh Ani, a prayer of gratitude for our soul returning to our bodies

each day. As the days grow shorter in November and we become more mindful of how our habits affect our mental health—coinciding with the holiday of Thanksgiving in America—Jewish tradition offers us inspired ways to express gratitude.

We have opportunities for gratitude throughout the day, when we pause to say a blessing before eating and drinking. The Talmud teaches that one who enjoys something from this world without a blessing is considered to have stolen from God. This isn't about divine punishment—it's about recognition. When we recite a blessing over food, we pause to acknowledge that what sustains us comes from beyond ourselves.

Similarly, when we give tzedakah, we are parting with money that we may have earned, but that isn't really ours in the first place. Jewish tradition teaches that everything ultimately belongs to God—"The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof," as Psalms re-



minds us. We are stewards, not owners, of our resources. Recognizing this bigger picture can itself cultivate gratitude. And giving tzedakah can function as an expression of gratitude when we donate in someone's honor. Whether marking a simcha, commemorating a yahrtzeit, or simply acknowledging someone's presence in your life, directing charitable giving in another's name transforms appreciation into tangible good. It says: because of the blessing you are in my

life, someone else will receive what they need.

We also express gratitude communally through Hallel, the collection of Psalms recited on festivals and Rosh Chodesh. These aren't whispered prayers of individual thanks—they're meant to be sung aloud, together. Hallel reminds us that some expressions of gratitude are too big to keep to ourselves. They require voices joining in, a collective recognition of the goodness we've experienced.

As November invites us toward reflection, these Jewish practices offer us pathways: gratitude at the start of each day, gratitude transformed into justice, gratitude that overflows into song. May we find opportunities—daily and communally—to say thank you, and to translate our gratitude into action.

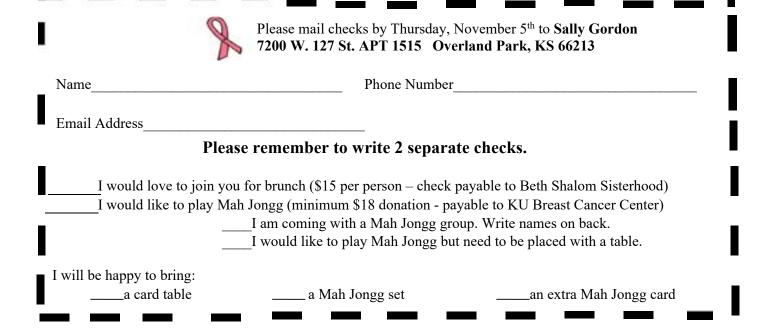

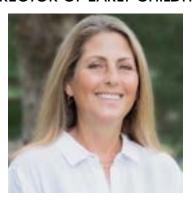

Attitude of Gratitude

November often brings with it a natural focus on gratitude. At RFEC, this season offers a special opportunity to teach our children to notice the good in their lives - and to express appreciation not just in words, but through thoughtful, caring actions.

Gratitude is more than saying "thank you." It's a mindset, a way of seeing the world through a lens of hakarat hatov - recognizing and naming the good. This Jewish value encourages us to pause and appreciate what we have, the people who help us, and the everyday blessings that often go unnoticed.

Toddlers and preschoolers are just beginning to understand the concept

of gratitude. Their world is naturally centered around their own needs and experiences - but the preschool years are a powerful time to plant the seeds of appreciation, empathy, and generosity. As educators, and as parents, we can nurture these qualities by modeling gratitude, creating space for reflection, and giving children opportunities to give back.

Here are some ways you can help foster gratitude and a spirit of giving at home:

Model Grateful Language

Children learn so much by watching us. When you say things like, "I'm so grateful for this beautiful day" or "I really appreciated your help setting the table," you're teaching your child to notice and name the good around them. Make gratitude part of your everyday language.

Create Simple Gratitude Rituals

At school, we often ask children what they are thankful for. You can do the same at home – while driving in the car, around the dinner table, during bedtime, or on a family walk. Ask questions like, "What made you smile today? Who helped you today? What's something you're thankful for right now?" These small conversations build a lasting habit of reflection.

Teach the Joy of Giving

Gratitude and generosity go hand in hand. When children learn to help others, they begin to understand that they have something to offer the world. Whether it's making a card for a friend or relative, donating gently used toys, or helping bake for a neighbor, acts of gemilut chasadim (loving kindness) help children feel capable, connected, and kind.

In our classrooms, we are intentional about teaching children how to express appreciation through words, actions, and feelings. We read stories about characters who show kindness and give thanks. We sing songs about being grateful, and we create art that reflects our gratitude.

As parents and grandparents, your role in shaping your child's sense of gratitude is powerful. When you model appreciation, give your children space to reflect, and offer ways to help others, you're helping them grow into people who not only notice the good - but who become the good in the world.

This November, may we all find ways to slow down, say thank you, and share our blessings with others. Wishing you a season filled with warmth, reflection, and gratitude.

What's on Your Jewish Bookshelf?

On Shabbat morning, November 15, the Beth Shalom Kindergarten students will participate in a Consecration service. They will proudly sing the Shema before the congregation and stand under a huge tallit with their parents to receive a blessing, The

children will then be presented with a wonderful gift, a child- sized Torah scroll! When they open the scroll, they will see many stories from the Torah written in simple English and accompanied by beautiful illustrations. The Kindergarteners have seen what the actual Torah looks like inside and know that this one is different in many ways. They know that they will be bringing this one home, keeping it in a special place that is easy to reach, and reading from it often.

We learn in the Book of Devarim 31:19 to "write down this poem and teach it to the people of Israel; put it in their mouths". The "poem" is understood to be the Torah and this Mitzvah, thought of as the final of the 613 Commandments, is today understood to mean we should keep

a copy of the Torah in our home. The most common way to do this is to own a bound copy of the Torah on a bookshelf at home.

Kindergarten is a great time to begin to add to your family's Jewish bookshelf! Leave room for everything from PJ Library books to biographies of famous Jews to ancient texts, philosophy, and history. If you are looking for suggestions, I am happy to help you.

Children love to be read to, and it is my hope that parents will set aside time to read from the mini-Torah scroll – and other Jewish books- so that eventually, the kids will read from them on their own ("put it into their mouths").

Mazel tov the Kindergarteners; we are all so very proud of you!
