Bringing More Shabbos to Beth Shalom

Beginning in February, 2026, we are looking forward to bringing more opportunities to connect on Shabbat. We already have many doorways open into Shabbat with our Main Sanctuary, Library Minyan, Shir L'Shabbat (monthly service with musical instruments at Asbury Methodist Church), and Tot Shabbat. We have also had occasional Northern Friday Nights in Brookside as well as lunch and learns or visiting scholars at the synagogue building.

On Friday, February 6, 2026, we are having a Kabbalat Shabbat service from 6-6:45 pm. This joyful Kabbalat Shabbat (Friday night) service will be led by our clergy, with a light oneg shabbat (snack) following. The dress is casual, the melodies are drawn from Herzl Camp, Camp Ramah, USY and other song-filled spaces. This will be a singing-focused, traditional Kabbalat Shabbat where all ages are welcome. RSVPs encouraged so that we can have enough cookies at the oneg Shabbat and communicate about future Friday night experiences.

On Monday, February 9, 2026 at 7 pm, we will have a feedback session on Zoom for anyone who participated. We are looking for input on how we can continue to shape these Friday night services.

In the near future, we seek to open other doorways into Shabbat at Beth Shalom. We are going to be exploring ways to bring back Friday night experiences aimed at families with children 6 and under. We are also seeking to develop openings for connecting over

Shabbat dinners – either in the synagogue building, group dinners with our northern presence, and also Shabbat dinner in people's homes. If you would like to be a thought partner on these initiatives, please email me at dglickman@bethshalomkc.org.

On a personal note: the Friday nights as a young man I spent at Hillel at University of Michigan, in Jerusalem, at Jewish camps, and on New York's Upper West Side during rabbinical school were

some of the most formational and impactful Jewish experiences of my life. The Friday night service has such easy-to-learn, singable melodies; the length is short by comparison to other services; it comes at the end of the week; it was a perfect space to meet and make friends; we would build organic Shabbat dinners following the service... In short, during the formative years of young adulthood, the rhythm of Shabbat became my internal metronome because of singing with friends at Kabbalat Shabbat experiences.

I see now, how many of your young people go to Shabbat dinners at Chabad or Hillel on campus, and find other ways to connect Jewishly with others to wind down the week. We hope that your spirit and energy can help us build a similar rhythm within our multi-generational Beth Shalom community.

Comfort in Community: Living with Pregnancy Loss

Last year, a few community members approached me about a particular type of grief: pregnancy or infant loss. This type of loss is sometimes kept private – maybe because it is too painful to discuss, or perhaps because they do not want to make others uncomfortable. Some people have had to live with concerns about stigma, or the pain of well-intentioned remarks that moved past the pain, such as assurances that the person will become pregnant again.

Yet losing a pregnancy can be a big deal. For many, it is an emotionally painful event with ongoing grief.

In an effort to help members of the Jewish community deal with this loss in a communal setting, a spiritual care service will be held for all adults who have lost a pregnancy at any time and feel a need to be with others and remember the child who did not enter their world. This program is open to people of all ages and genders, who have personal experience with this type of grief.

What About the Women?

Over the years, many people have asked me why I do not include the *imahot*, the wives of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, every time that I lead the amidah aloud. Why, they ask, do I not include the word “*imoteinu*” (our female ancestors) every time we pray the word “*avoteinu*” (our [male] ancestors); and why, too, do I not include “Miriam” when we invoke “Moses.”

My answer is three-fold, one part is based on how Hebrew works, one part has its roots in the history and evolution of prayer, and one part is personal preference. Let me explain, and then leave it to you to decide how YOU will daven when you are the leader or when you pray by yourself.

HOW HEBREW WORKS: Hebrew is a gendered language, and every noun is either masculine or feminine. While there is a movement to create a gender-fluid Hebrew, that is not what I am addressing here. Biblical as well as modern Hebrew uses the feminine form as a known gender, and masculine form for both male and for when the gender is unspecified, unknown or for when there are both male and female things included. So when there is a crowd of all women, the feminine plural is used. When there is a crowd of all men, the masculine plural is used; and when there are both women and men, or if you do not know the makeup of the group, the masculine plural is used. And so I was taught that when in our prayers we say “*Avoteinu*,” it does not refer ONLY to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, but also to Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah, as they are our ancestors as well. So when we pray the word *avoteinu*, we mean to include the wives/the women.

While I recognize that today this is changing – there is a movement for a third plural form for a mix, and there are some who include both the feminine and masculine plural in such a case – in the Torah, Rabbinic writings, and Hebrew of the Middle Ages, when many of our prayers were codified, the masculine plural includes women.

THE HISTORY AND EVOLUTION OF PRAYER: When books were exceptionally expensive, before everyone had their own siddur, the *shaliach tzibbur*, the prayer leader, would open and close each prayer aloud, and hold time/space in between for the congreg-



gation to create their own uttered prayer or meditation based on the theme of the opening and closing. Over time, these opening and closing lines became fixed in our liturgy, but the prayer in the middle was not fixed as quickly, and different communities had slightly or very different middles, if you will. Since there is a tradition of changing up the middle of the prayer but keeping the *peticha* (opening) and *chatimah* (closing) unchanged, I choose to keep the traditional wording

of our prayers' *petichot* and *chatimot*. This means that I do not say *Avoteinu v'imoteinu* at the opening of the amidah, and I do not say *Magen Avraham u'Foked Sarah* at the end. But I will include Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah, as part of the body of the prayer.

PERSONAL PREFERENCE: When we say Abraham, Isaac and Jacob in the body of a prayer, I have no issue with including Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel and Leah, except insofar as these are not the words that my ancestors prayed, and I love the idea of tradition and continuity. Therefore, I sometimes pray the way my ancestors likely prayed, without adding the *imahot*, the female ancestors. But I also deeply value the needs and desires of our congregants for whom including the *imahot* is very meaningful. And so, I end up including them, but not all of the time. I hope you will forgive me for not being 100% consistent on this.

I do not include “Miriam” when we invoke “Moses” because that was not at all the tradition of that prayer, and including Miriam's name feels like an interruption in the prayer to me. Sometimes, I feel like the editors of our siddurim and machzorim go above and beyond to make everyone feel included, and in so doing, they inadvertently derail the prayer, at least for those of us who find tradition deeply meaningful.

I am constantly threading the needle between my needs as a davener and my obligation as an emissary of the community, between my desire to connect with all the Jews who came before us, and my hope to make every congregant feel seen and heard and valued.

I hope and pray that this article helps you understand the choices that I make as your prayer leader, and perhaps might even help you to shape your own purposeful choices when you pray. I welcome your thoughts and opinions!
